

- It's not a project, it's a process
 - Action Team Approach
- Plan and Focus
 - One-Year Action Plans

The National Network of Partnership Schools

1996 - Present

- Open to Schools, School Districts, State Departments, and Organizations
- Provide Training and Resources
- Organized, Goal-Focused Programs
- Collect Program Data Annually

Lessons Learned from NNPS

- An Interest and Need Exists
 - **1500** schools
 - 150 school district members
- Sustainability Requires a Systemic Approach
- Principal Support is Essential
- Program Evaluation Aids Program Development

Principals are Critical

Findings:

- Change in Leadership is Disruptive
- Principal Support is Necessary
 - Vision and Direction
 - Allocation of Resources

Translation to Practice:

- Training on the Role of Principals
- Principals Matter

- Annual Program Evaluation
- Evaluation of Activities

From Pilot Project to National Program

Challenges

- Control
 - Change Happens
 - Implementation Varies
- Competing Priorities of Schools and Districts
 - Testing pressures
 - Focus on classroom pressures
- Heterogeneity
 - One size cannot fit all
