

Grant Title: RESEARCH GRANTS FOR PREVENTING VIOLENCE AND VIOLENCE-RELATED INJURY (R01)

Area of Research: Injury and violence prevention.

Release and Expiration: Release Date: January 26, 2010.

Application Deadline: January 21, 2010 extended to February 5, 2010. Letter of Intent Deadline: December 18, 2009.

Amount: Award Ceiling: \$400,000. Expected Number of Awards: 5.

Length of Support: The budget period will be for one year and the anticipated project period up to three years.

Summary: The purposes of the NCIPC extramural violence prevention research program are to: Build the scientific base for the prevention of violence by helping to expand and advance our understanding of the etiology and primary prevention of interpersonal and self-directed violence; encourage professionals from a wide spectrum of disciplines of epidemiology, behavioral and social sciences, medicine, biostatistics, public health, health economics, law, and criminal justice, to perform research in order to prevent violence more effectively; encourage investigators to propose research that involves the development and testing of primary prevention strategies as well as research on methods to enhance the adoption and maintenance of effective strategies among individuals, organizations, or communities. The purpose of this announcement is to expand and advance the understanding of violence, its causes, and prevention strategies. The following research objectives are the focus of this solicitation: (1) Dissemination/Implementation Research: Conduct studies aimed at identifying and evaluating efficient and effective methods for the dissemination and implementation of evidence-based interventions, programs, and policies to prevent either the perpetration of or victimization from violence. This research is intended to bridge the gap between prevention research and everyday practice by building a knowledge base about how evidence-based violence prevention information and strategies are disseminated, translated and integrated for use by communities and policy makers. (2) Efficacy/Effectiveness Research: Evaluate the efficacy, effectiveness, and cost effectiveness of primary prevention strategies, programs, and policies to prevent the perpetration of violence. These strategies, programs or policies can be targeted universally or at selected or high-risk populations, but cannot be targeted at individuals who have already engaged in the perpetration of violence. (3) Etiologic Research: Conduct studies to examine the development of intimate partner violence, sexual violence, and/or child maltreatment perpetration. These studies should be designed to provide a better understanding of the proximal developmental pathways and social circumstances that contribute to the perpetration of intimate partner violence, sexual violence, or child maltreatment.
