

Grant Title: DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION INTERVENTION RESEARCH (R01, R03, R21)

Area of Research: Research to advance the science of drug abuse and drug-related HIV prevention

Release and Expiration Dates: July 25, 2008 release; September 8, 2011 expiration.

Annual Deadline: For R01 NEW Applications: February 5, June 5, October 5. For R01 Renewal, Resubmission, or Revision: March 5, July 5, November 5. For R03 and R21 NEW Applications: February 16, June 16, October 16. For R03 and R21 Renewal, Resubmission, or Revision: March 16, July 16, November 16.

Amount: R01 – up to \$500,000. R21 – up to \$275,000. R03 - Budgets for direct costs of up to \$50,000 per year.

Length of Support: R01 - up to 5 years. R21 - Up to 2 years. R03 - Up to 2 years.

Eligible Applicants: Public/State Controlled Institutions of Higher Education, Private Institutions of Higher Education, Hispanic-serving Institutions, Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions, Nonprofits with and without 501(c)(3) IRS Status, Small Businesses, For-Profit Organizations, State Governments, Native American Tribal Governments and Designated Organizations, County Governments, City or Township Governments, Special District Governments, Independent School Districts, Public Housing Authorities/Indian Housing Authorities, U.S. Territory or Possession, Indian/Native American Tribal Governments, Regional Organizations, Non-domestic Entities, Eligible Agencies of the Federal Government, Faith-based or Community-based Organizations.

Agency/ Department: Department of Health and Human Services, National Institutes of Health (NIH),

Summary: The purpose FOA is to encourage Research Project (R01) applications, exploratory / developmental R21 applications, pilot/feasibility R03 applications from institutions/organizations that propose to advance the science of drug abuse and drug-related HIV prevention through 1) the development of novel prevention approaches, 2) the testing of novel and adapted prevention intervention approaches 3) the elucidation of processes associated with the selection, adoption, adaptation, implementation, sustainability, and financing of empirically validated interventions, and 4) the development of new methodologies suitable for the design and analysis of prevention research studies. Programs of research are intended to provide pathways toward the discovery of population-level approaches for the prevention of drug abuse and dependence, drug-related problems (interpersonal violence, criminal involvement, productivity loss), and drug related illness (HIV, hepatitis).
